Many paper mills do not allow carrier stock cartons to be included in any of the grades they accept. The main reason is that they will not break down to individual fibers in the machine when being processed in the remanufacturing process. To recycle a corrugated container you need to remove all contents including plastic bags and Styrofoam.

- Boxboard or chipboard is often confused with cardboard because of its shared usage and similar general form.
- Boxboard is usually grayish in color when you tear it and look at the inner layer.
- Boxboard is considered a lesser quality paper and should not be mixed with corrugated cardboard.
- Do not recycle cardboard that has mold. Other problems could arise if the cardboard was sitting outside.

 Boxboard is recyclable, but if it is the primary material your business generates it needs to be kept separate because it has limited use.

 Depending on the volume that is produced, a vendor will supply containers that are serviced one time to several times per week by compactor trucks.

 Almost all paper mills use old cardboard as their feedstock when making craft paper which is used to make corrugated cardboard. We encourage every body to recycle cardboard and paper to make the world a better place to live.
